
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

Location.

HIS Institution is located in the healthful and flourishing city of Westminster, Carroll County, Maryland, on the line of the Western Maryland Railroad, about midway between the cities of Baltimore and Hagerstown. The building stands on a commanding eminence at the "West End," overlooking the whole city and many miles of the surrounding country, affording one of the most beautiful and picturesque views in

Accommodations.

The main centre building, the only one which has heretofore been occupied, is a spacious and well constructed edifice, containing ample room for the accommodation of a large number of boarding students, but owing to the increasing patronage, the Board of Trustees, at their last meeting, determined to make a large addition to the present building. This addition, which is thirty-eight feet in width, by fifty feet in length and five stories in height, is now in course of erection, and will be ready for use by the 1st of October.

The Vice-Principal, Preceptress and other members of the Faculty reside in the building, eat at the same table with the students, and have a constant oversight of them. The ladies' private and public rooms are entirely separate from those of the gentlemen, and there is no association of the male and female students, except in the presence of their instructors. The grounds belonging to the College contain eight acres, allowing sufficient range for the exercise of students during the time not allotted to study.

Patronage and Direction.

The College property is owned by the Board of Trustees, incorporated in March, 1868, by the General Assembly of Maryland, and the Institution is under the special patronage of the Maryland Annual Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church; but nothing will be introduced either into the course of study or discipline and management of the Institution which can be in any way objectionable to students of other religious persuasions.

Conditions of Admission.

- 1. Each student, upon entering, is required to sign a pledge, on his honor, to obey all the laws of the Institution so long as he may remain in it.
 - 2. The student must be well recommended as to moral character.
- 3. Prompt payment of all College bills must be made. (See Summary of Expenses, p. 21.)
- 4. The student or pupil must agree to take all the studies of the class entered, unless excused from any portion thereof at the time of entering.
- 5. If the student be a minor, his spending-money must be deposited with the Principal, to be returned in such amounts as he may think best.

Bules of Deportment.

- 1. Use no profane or indecent language.
- 2. Do not use or countenance the use of any intoxicating liquor as a beverage.
 - 3. Do not play at any game of chance.
- 4. Do not attend any place of amusement, or public exhibition, without the consent of the Principal.
- 5. Do not loiter in the halls, or make any improper noise in the building.
- 6. In passing from one part of the building to another, proceed in a regular and orderly manner.
- 7. Never be absent, unless excused by proper authority, from any roll-call, recitation, lecture, or other stated exercise.

- 8. Repair promptly, at the ringing of the College bell, to the place indicated thereby.
- 9. Resist not the authority of any Officer of the Institution, nor show him any disrespect.
 - 10. Always be neat in your apparel and cleanly in your habits.
 - 11. Do not deface or injure any property of the College.
- 12. Never go, without permission, into any part of the building or grounds appropriated to others.
 - 13. Make no improper use of the black-boards.
- 14. Do not leave the College premises at any time without permission; state the business for which you wish to leave, whenever required to do so, and always return promptly at the time specified.
- 15. Never associate or converse with any student of the opposite sex, except in the presence and hearing of a teacher, without permission.
 - 16. Do not have or use fire-arms of any description.
- 17. Do not prompt, either by word or gesture, any student during recitation.
 - 18. At all religious exercises, be reverential in your demeanor.
- 19. Do not attempt to pass any letter, book, or other article, to any student of the opposite sex, except through the hands of the Principal or Vice-Principal.
- 20. Never put or leave things out of order in the dormitory, in your desk, in the study rooms, chapel, or elsewhere.
- 21. Do not take advantage of any possible omission in these rules to act in any respect contrary to your own sense of right.
 - 22. Do not use tobacco in any form in the College building.
- 23. Let all your conduct be such as becomes ladies and gentlemen, and consistent with the object and design of your parents and guardians in placing you here as students.
 - 24. Let all the time allotted to study be spent in study.

GRADE OF MERIT, AWARDS. &C.

The grade of merit, both in deportment and recitation, will be from 1 to 10. Every act of disobedience to every established rule of the Institution will be demerited, and every unexcused absence from recitation, or failure to recite a lesson assigned, will be demerited. Certificates of Distinction will be distributed at the end of the year to the students having the required averages in deportment or in the studies for which said certificates are awarded.

Domestic Arrangements, &c.

The Steward and Matron will have the management of the Boarding Department, under the direction and sanction of the Board of Trustees, and will spare no pains to render entire satisfaction to the patrons of the Institution.

All students from abroad will be required to board in the Institution, unless otherwise specially arranged with the Principal

For the information of parents, it may be necessary to state that boarding students are required to bring their own sheets, pillows and pillow-cases, blankets, counterpanes, umbrellas, &c.; the name of the owner plainly marked on each article.

It is very desirable that students should enter at the beginning and remain until the close of the session. Students will not remain at the College during any portion of the time allotted to vacation, unless by special arrangement with the Principal.

Assistants will be employed for each Professor, when the number of students render it necessary.

Special damages will be assessed on those students who injure or destroy College property.

Charges for boarding and tuition will commence at the time of a student's entrance, but no deduction will be made for absence afterwards, except in case of protracted sickness, nor will money be refunded in case of a student being suspended or expelled.

Boarding students who leave the Institution every week on Friday evening, and return on the following Monday, will be entitled to a deduction of one-fourth from the standard price for boarding.

Collegiate Bear.

The Fall Term will commence on Tuesday, September the 5th, 1871, and continue till January 26th, 1872. The Spring Term will commence January 29th, and close the 3d Thursday in June, 1872.

Adopted by the Board of Trustees at the Annual Meeting held June 16th, 1870.

Resolved, That the Local Committee of the Board be and they are hereby restricted, from this date, from extending credit on account of Tuition, Board, and Books.

Resolved, That said Committee be and they are hereby restricted from extending accommodation to the children of Ministers, who desire to enter the College, except children of the Ministerial members of the Maryland Annual Conference, and the Ministers of the several denominations of the city of Westminster, the General Board reserving to itself the exclusive privilege of granting such accommodation to other applicants, not herein provided for, at any regular meeting of the Board.

Resolved, That the children of Ministers of other Conferences and denominations, may be admitted as students at one half the price charged for others.
