

Location.

THIS Institution is located in the healthful and flourishing City of Westminster, Carroll County, Maryland, on the line of the Western Maryland Railroad, about midway between the cities of Baltimore and Hagerstown.

The building stands on a commanding eminence at the "West End," overlooking the whole city and many miles of the surrounding country, affording one of the most beautiful and picturesque views in the State.

Accommodations.

The main centre building is a spacious edifice, five stories high, which, with a large addition built last year, affords ample accommodations for Chapel, Recitation Rooms, Hall for the Societies, Professors' Apartments and Dormitories.

The Vice-Principal, Preceptress and other members of the Faculty reside in the building, eat at the same table with the students, and have a constant oversight of them. The ladies' private and public rooms are entirely separate from those of the gentlemen, and there is no association of the male and female students except in the presence of their instructors. The grounds belonging to the College contain eight acres, allowing sufficient range for the exercise of students during the time not allotted to study.

Patronage and Direction.

The College property is owned by the Board of Trustees, incorporated in March, 1868, by the General Assembly of Maryland, and the Institution is under the special patronage of the Maryland Annual Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church; but nothing will be introduced either into the Course of Study or the discipline and management of the Institution which can be, in any way, objectionable to students of other religious persuasions.

Conditions of Admission.

1. Candidates for admission into any Class must be examined in those studies already pursued by that Class.

2. Each student, upon entering, is furnished with a copy of the Rules of the Institution, and is required to sign a pledge to obey all the laws of the Institution so long as he may remain in it.

3. Each student must be well recommended as to moral character.

4. Prompt payment of all College bills must be made.

5. The student must agree to take all the studies of the Class entered, unless excused from any portion thereof, at the time of entering.

6. No student shall, at his own option, drop a study during a session. Communications from Parents or Guardians in reference to this or to any other regulation of the College, should be addressed to the President, who will promptly lay them before the Faculty of the College for consideration and action.

7. If a student be a minor, his spending money must be deposited with the President, to be returned in such sums as he may think best.

Examinations.

There are two examinations of all the Classes every year. The one begins on the last Monday in January, and the other on the second Monday in June. The latter is the concluding examination of the academic year; the former is called the intermediate examination. These examinations are open to the public.

Commencement and Vacations.

The Annual Commencement is held on the third Thursday in June, on which occasion degrees are publicly conferred.

Vacation extends from Commencement-day until the first Tuesday in September, on which day the regular Course of Study will commence.

There will be an intermission of recitations on Good Friday and Easter Monday, and for one week at Christmas.

LECTURES.

Lectures are delivered to the Classes, during the Session of the College, on Natural Philosophy, Physiology, Chemistry, Astronomy, Geology and Paleontology and Philology.

SOCIETIES.

The Irving and Webster Literary Societies of Young Gentlemen, and the Browning Literary Society of Young Ladies, hold regular weekly meetings, and it is the desire of the Faculty that all the Students avail themselves of the advantages of these valuable and instructive organizations.

LITERARY AIDS.

All necessary aids, as Maps, Philosophical and Chemical Apparatus, &c., are provided. The Students, also, have access to Libraries comprising 2,500 volumes. Text Books, Stationery, etc., may be obtained at the College, at Baltimore retail prices, for cash.

PARTIAL COURSE.

Students not wishing to pursue all the Studies in the Regular Course, may arrange with the Faculty for a more limited Course, and will be examined only as to their qualifications to pursue such Course.

☛ It is very desirable that Students should enter at the beginning and remain until the close of the Session. Students will not remain at the College during any portion of the time allotted to vacation, unless by special arrangement with the Principal.

THEOLOGICAL COURSE.

Students preparing for the sacred office of the Ministry, pursue the Studies of the Regular Course, but a period in each day is assigned for a recitation to the President on such Theological Text Books, as have been prescribed by the Board of Trustees.

GRADE OF MERIT, AWARDS, &c.

The grade of merit, both in deportment and recitation, is from 1 to 10. Every violation of College law, and every unexcused absence from a stated exercise is demerited.

At the Annual Commencement, CERTIFICATES OF DISTINCTION are awarded to such Students as have attained an average grade of Nine, in all the Studies of any Department.

Non-resident Students are required to board in the Institution, unless a different arrangement is made with the Principal.

For the information of Parents, it may be necessary to state that Boarding Students are required to bring their own sheets, pillows, pillow-cases, blankets and counterpanes; the name of the owner plainly marked on each article. Special damages will be assessed on those Students who injure or destroy College property.

Tuition fees are charged from the *beginning* of the Session, but the charge for board dates from the entrance of the Student. In case of absence caused by *protracted* sickness, a deduction is made for board; but no money will be refunded in case of suspension or expulsion.
