## LOCATION

The College occupies an eminence at the west end of Westminster, nearly one thousand feet above tidewater, affording a view of town and landscape rarely equaled for beauty. The elevation, good water, and mountain breezes all contribute toward making summer work on The Hill a pleasure.

Westminster is a city of about six thousand inhabitants, thirty miles northwest of Baltimore and fifty miles north of Washington. It is on the Western Maryland Railway and several bus lines and is accessible from all points by good roads.

## BUILDINGS

Science Hall, Lewis Hall, Levine Hall, Old Main, and the Library will be open for instruction. Dormitories will be open for the first time on Wednesday afternoon, June 19. The first meal to be served in the College Dining Room will be breakfast, Thursday, June 20.

## STUDENT'S OUTFIT

It is necessary for each student to bring the following articles: bed linen, pillow, blankets, towels, and personal articles. Commercial laundries will do student work at a reasonable rate.

## ADMISSION

The same rules of admission will apply as for the winter sessions. In general, this means that the student must show ability and willingness to do college work as indicated by high school grades, personality ratings, scores on standard tests, and recommendation of the high school principal. Transfer students will be accepted from other accredited colleges upon the submission of satisfactory transcripts of record.

Graduate students must submit transcripts of the record of their undergraduate work. Matriculation examinations for graduate students are given in Westminster in February and July.

A student from another college who does not wish to matriculate for a degree at Western Maryland College but who wishes to enroll in the summer program should submit a statement of good standing from the registrar of the institution he is attending.

## REGISTRATION

All students should make preliminary registration by Monday, June 17. Official registration will take place Thursday, June 20, between 8:30 a. m. and 12:00 noon. The regularly scheduled morning classes will be held that afternoon. Preliminary registration for the second term should be made by July 22; official registration, on July 25. Preliminary registration may be made by mail; write for blanks.

## STUDENT LOAD

The summer session consists of two five-week terms. During each of these terms, a student completes a semester's work in the courses selected. Because of the intensive work required by such a program, the student load is limited to six semester hours during each term, unless permission to exceed the standard load is granted by the Dean.



## GRADES

The scholastic standing of a student is indicated by a system of letter grades: A, B, C, D, passing; E, conditioned; F, failed; Inc., incomplete. Students who withdraw before the end of the course receive a grade of Withdrawn Satisfactory, Withdrawn Unsatisfactory, or Withdrawn Failing. Numerical values are not assigned to these letter grades.

## MASTER OF EDUCATION PROGRAM

Western Maryland College offers programs leading to the degree of Master of Education for selected students interested in a fifth year of combined internship teaching and graduate study and for selected teachers in service who are interested in meeting requirements for renewal of certificates or for additional certificates through part-time and summer session courses.

Specialists from the United States Office of Education, from the Maryland State Department of Education, and from the city and county school systems will assist the resident and visiting faculty in research in problems of reading, community study, core curriculum, education of the slow learner, supervision, and administration.

## ABSENCES

Students are expected to attend all classes; unavoidable absences must be made up.

## BOOKS

The required textbooks may be purchased at the College Bookstore. All charges must be paid at the time of making the purchase; no books or supplies may be charged in the summer session.

## COURSES OF INSTRUCTION

Courses are designated by numerals, a four-digit system being used for graduate courses. A three-digit system is used for undergraduate courses; the hundreds digit in the numerals indicates the classification the student must attain to be eligible for the course. Without special permission, freshmen may not register for any course numbered 200 or above; sophomores, 300 or above; juniors, 400 or above; seniors, 500 or above. In some advanced undergraduate courses, graduate credit may be arranged.

Courses marked with asterisks (e.g., \*101) are designated as introductory courses in relation to major requirements.

If there is not a sufficient registration for any particular course, the College retains the right to withdraw that course from the summer curriculum.
