THE SUMMER SESSION AT WESTERN MARYLAND COLLEGE

The Summer Program

Western Maryland College offers both undergraduate and graduate courses during its summer session, which consists of two five-week terms. During each of these terms, a student completes a semester's work in the courses selected. Because of the intensive work required by such a program, the student load is limited to six semester hours during each term, unless permission to add an additional semester hour is granted by the Dean of the Faculty.

Undergraduate Program

The program for undergraduates allows them to accelerate their education and graduate in less than the customary four years; it provides opportunities to carry courses which either are not offered during the regular semesters or are impossible to schedule at those times; it makes it possible for students to repeat courses with which they have had academic difficulties in the regular school year.

Graduate Program

The graduate program is in the field of Education and leads to the degree of Master of Education. Students interested in securing this degree should obtain the graduate catalogue and further information relative to this program from the Director of the Graduate Program.

Location

Western Maryland College is located in Westminster, Maryland, a city of about seven thousand inhabitants. It is accessible from all points by good roads. It is about an hour's drive from Baltimore or Gettysburg, and about two hours' drive from Washington.

The College occupies an eminence at the west end of Westminster, nearly one thousand feet above tidewater. The temperature on the Hill is usually several degrees lower than temperatures of surrounding areas.

Instructional and Resident Facilities

Rooms in Carroll Hall, Englar Hall, the Infirmary, Levine Hall of Music, Lewis Hall of Science, Lewis Recitation Hall, and the Library will be used for instruction during the summer session.

Students will be housed in Albert Norman Ward Hall (men in one section, women in another). The dormitory will be open for occupancy on Tuesday afternoon, June 17. It is necessary for each student to bring the following articles: bcd linen, pillow, blankets, towels, and personal articles. Commercial laundries will do student work at a reasonable rate.

All undergraduate students are expected to reside in the dormitory unless they are living at home or with relatives or have the permission of the Dean of Students to live off-campus.

The first meal to be served for summer school students in the Englar Memorial Dining Hall will be breakfast on Wednesday, June 18.

Summer school students may purchase an activities card from the Physical Plant Director at a cost of \$10.00 per term. This card entitles them to the use of the college golf course, the Harlow swimming pool, and the college tennis courts.

Honor Code and Honor System

Western Maryland College students subscribe to and support in all academic matters an Honor Code. It assumes that all students who join the college community will share the values, goals, and responsibilities inherent in an honor system and the pride which it engenders.

Admission

Students in good standing at Western Maryland College or at another accredited college are admissable to the summer session. A statement of good standing as of the beginning of the summer session must be submitted from the registrar or dean of the institution the student is attending.

Students who wish to begin college work in the summer must meet the standards of the Admissions Committee and have their application approved by that committee.

Matriculation examinations for graduate students are given in Westminster in February and July. Students who wish to enroll for graduate courses without necessarily matriculating for the Master's degree here should consult with the Director of the Graduate Program as to eligibility for the desired courses.

Registration

All sudents should make preliminary registration by Wednesday, June 11. Official registration will take place Wednesday, June 18, between 8:30 and 11:30 a.m. The regularly scheduled morning classes will be held that afternoon.

Preliminary registration for the second term should be made by July 14; official registration on July 21.

Preliminary registration may be made by mail.

Students are expected to attend all classes. If an unavoidable absence occurs, the student must make up the work missed.

Grades

The scholastic standing of a student is indicated by a system of letter grades A. B. C. D, passing; F, failed; Inc., incomplete. Students who withdraw during the first three weeks of the course receive a grade of W; students who withdraw after July 3 (after August 8 in the second term) receive a grade of F. Numerical values are not assigned to any of these letter grades.

EXPENSES

All charges must be paid in full before a student may attend classes.

For summer work, there is a registration fee of \$10.00. When this fee is paid in preliminary registration, the charge is \$6.00.

Tuition is charged at the rate of \$30.00 per semester hour of credit. Students who wish to audit a course are charged at the rate of \$15.00 per semester hour of credit for the course.

Board and room charges, two in a room, are \$150.00 per person per term. An additional charge of \$10.00 per term is made for single occupancy of a room. (Linens are not furnished for summer session students.)

It is assumed that a student will not withdraw from the College during a term. In the event that such a withdrawal is necessary after the first three class periods in a course, refunds for tuition, fees, and room will not be allowed. A pro-rata refund for board will be made.

The required textbooks may be purchased at the College Bookstore. All charges must be paid at the time of making the purchase.

1969 SUMMER INSTITUTE

June 30 - August 8 _____SUMMER INSTITUTE IN BIOLOGY AND CHEMISTRY

A summer institute for junior and senior high school teachers has been made possible at Western Maryland College by a grant from the National Science Foundation. Registration will be limited to forty students.

The institute is designed for teachers in junior and senior high school whose background training is weak or insufficient in biology and chemistry. Offerings for institute participants will include a study of basic modern concepts

backings for institute participants will include a study of basic modern concepts of biology and an elementary study of chemistry. Special field trips and lectures have been arranged. Participants will enroll for eight semester hours credit. For further information on the institute program, write to Dr. Harwell P. AFFILIATION WITH THE MARYLAND SCHOOL FOR THE DEAF

Western Maryland College and the Maryland School for the Deaf, in Frederick, Maryland, have developed a program for training students to teach the deaf. Courses will be offered on both undergraduate and graduate levels. The initial courses will be taught in Frederick at the Maryland School for the Deaf.

Students will register with Western Maryland College and pay the fees to the College and will receive Western Maryland College credits.

The courses to be offered this summer are listed as Education courses (Education 5880, 5881, 5883, 5886, 5887).

COURSES OF INSTRUCTION

Courses are designated by numerals, a four-digit system being used for graduate courses. A three-digit system is used for undergraduate courses; the hundreds digit in the numerals indicates the classification the student must attain to be eligible for the course. Without special permission, freshmen may not register for any course numbered 201 or above; sophomores, 301 or above; juniors, 401 or above; seniors, 501 or above. No credit toward the baccalaureate degree will be given for courses numbered for graduate study. In some advanced undergraduate courses, graduate credit may be arranged.

Courses marked with asterisks (e.g., *101) are designated as introductory courses in relation to major requirements.

Each three-semester-hour course meets twenty-five ninety-minute periods. See note on calendar page.

If there is not a sufficient registration for any particular course, the College retains the right to withdraw that course from the summer curriculum.
