THE SUMMER SESSION AT WESTERN MARYLAND COLLEGE

The Summer Program

Western Maryland College offers both undergraduate and graduate courses during its summer session, which consists of two five-week terms. During each of these terms, a student completes a semester's work in the courses selected. Because of the intensive work required by such a program, the student load is limited to six semester hours during each term, unless permission to add an additional semester hour is granted by the Dean of the Faculty.

Undergraduate Program

The program for undergraduates allows them to accelerate their education and graduate in less than the customary four years; it provides opportunities to carry courses which either are not offered during the regular semesters or are impossible to schedule at those times; it makes it possible for students to repeat courses with which they have had academic difficulties in the regular school year.

Graduate Program

The graduate program is in the field of Education and leads to the degree of Master of Education. Students interested in securing this degree should obtain the graduate catalogue and further information relative to this program from the Director of the Graduate Program.

Location

Western Maryland College is located in Westminster, Maryland, a city of about seven thousand inhabitants. It is accessible from all points by good roads. It is about an hour's drive from Baltimore or Gettysburg, and about two hours' drive from Washington.

The College occupies an eminence at the west end of Westminster, nearly one thousand feet above tidewater. The temperature on the Hill is usually several degrees lower than temperatures of surrounding areas.

Instructional and Resident Facilities

Rooms in Carroll Hall, Englar Hall, the Fine Art Building, the Infirmary, Lewis Hall of Science, Lewis Recitation Hall, The Library, and Memorial Hall will be used for instruction during the summer session.

Students will be housed in Albert Norman Ward Hall (men in one section; women in another). The dormitory will be open for occupancy on Sunday afternoon, June 18. It is necessary for each student to bring the following articles: bed linen, pillow, blankets, towels, and personal articles. Commercial laundries will do student work at a reasonable rate.

All undergraduate students are expected to reside in the dormitory unless they are living at home or with relatives or have the permission of the Dean of Students to live off-campus.

The first meal to be served for summer school students in the Englar Memorial Dining Hall will be supper on Sunday, June 18.

Summer school students may purchase an activities card from the Physical Plant Director at a cost of \$10.00 per term. This card entitles them to the use of the college golf course, the Harlow swimming pool, and the college tennis courts.

Honor Code and Honor System

Western Maryland College students subscribe to and support in all academic matters an Honor Code. It assumes that all students who join the college community will share the values, goals, and responsibilities inherent in an honor system and the pride which it engenders.

Admission

Students in good standing at Western Maryland College or at another accredited college are admissible to the summer session. A statement of good standing as of the beginning of the summer session must be submitted from the registrar or dean of the institution the student is attending.

Students who wish to begin college work in the summer must meet the standards of the Admission Committee and have their application approved by that committee.

Matriculation examinations for graduate students are given in Westminster in April, July, and November. Students who wish to enroll for graduate courses without necessarily matriculating for the Master's Degree here should consult with the Director of the Graduate Program as to eligibility for the desired courses.

Registration—Graduate

Returning graduate students will receive registration materials for the summer session. New students should secure the forms from the Education Office. All registration materials should be submitted with \$10.00 for each course requested. This fee is non-refundable (unless the College cancels the course) but is part of the total tuition due.

A late fee of \$5.00 will be charged for all registrations received after June 8 for the first term of the summer session and after July 13 for the second term.

Registration—Undergraduate

Students currently enrolled in Western Maryland College should register for summer courses with their adviser.

Other undergraduate students should submit the enclosed application form at least a week prior to the opening of the summer term. A late registration fee of \$5.00 will be charged for registrations received after this date.

Undergraduate students will report to Elderdice Hall for official registration between 8:30 and 11:30 a.m., Monday, June 19 (July 24 for the second term); at this time, they will receive class enrollment cards.

Grades

The scholastic standing of a student is indicated by a system of letter grades A,B,C,D. passing; F. failed; Inc. incomplete. Students who withdraw during the first three weeks of the course receive a grade of W; students who withdraw after July 7 (after August 11 in the second term), receive a grade of F. Numerical values are not assigned to any of these letter grades.

EXPENSES

All charges must be paid in full before a student may attend classes.-

Tuition is charged at the rate of \$40.00 per semester hour of credit. Students who wish to audit a course are charged at the rate of \$20.00 per semester hour of credit for the course.

Board and room charges, two in a room, are \$165.00 per person per term. Depending upon enrollment, a limited number of single rooms may be available. If such space does become available, an additional charge of \$10.00 per term is made for single occupancy of a room. (Linens are not furnished for summer school students).

It is assumed that a student will not withdraw from the College during a term. In the event that such a withdrawal is necessary after the first three class periods in a course, refunds for tuition, fees, and room will not be allowed. A pro-rata refund for board will be made.

The required textbooks may be purchased at the College Bookstore. All charges must be paid at the time of making the purchase.

1972 SUMMER WORKSHOPS

June 26—July 14—WORKSHOP FOR TEACHERS OF THE DEAF

A summer workshop for teachers of the deaf will be conducted by Western Maryland College from June 26 to July 14, 1972. Registration will be limited to thirty students, selection based on the date of application.

The program is designed to provide the student with an introduction to the audio-logical and psychological evaluation and diagnostic techniques used in assessing deaf children.

Students will enroll for two courses and receive three semester hours of graduate credit for each course. Classes will be held at the Maryland School for the Deaf in Frederick, Maryland.

July 24—August 4—CHARACTER EDUCATION WORKSHOP

A summer workshop in Character Education for Teachers will be conducted in conjunction with the Character Education Project of San Antonio, Texas. Three graduate credits will be granted by Western Maryland College. Tuition for the twenty selected participants will be funded by the American Institute for Character Education.

The workshop will explore value-oriented approaches to education for the development of responsible citizens. Programs for character development which have been field-tested in various segments of the nation will be examined, and participants will be encouraged to conduct further experimental studies in their own classrooms.

Sessions will be conducted from 9:00 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. daily on the Western Maryland College campus. Coordinator of the workshop will be Miss Sara L. Ensor, Assistant Professor of Directed Studies, Hagerstown Junior College, 751 Robinwood Drive, Hagerstown, Md. 21740.

COURSES OF INSTRUCTION

Each department has a code number shown in parentheses at the head of the departmental listing.

Courses are designated by departments and a three-digit system of numerals. The first, or hundreds, digit in a number indicates the class standing a student must obtain to be eligible for the course. Without special permission from the Dean of the Faculty, freshmen may not register for any course numbered 201 or above; sophomores, 301 or above; juniors, 401 or above; seniors, 501 or above. No credit toward the baccalaureate degree will be given for courses numbered for graduate credit.

Courses marked with asterisks (e.g. *101) are designated as introductory courses in relation to major requirements.

Each three-semester-hour course meets twenty-five ninety-minute periods (or the equivalent) during a term. Students are expected to attend all classes. If an unavoidable absence occurs, the student must make up the work missed.

Course descriptions for courses listed in the regular catalogue have been omitted from this catalogue.

If there is not a sufficient registration for any particular course, the College retains the right to withdraw that course from the summer curriculum.

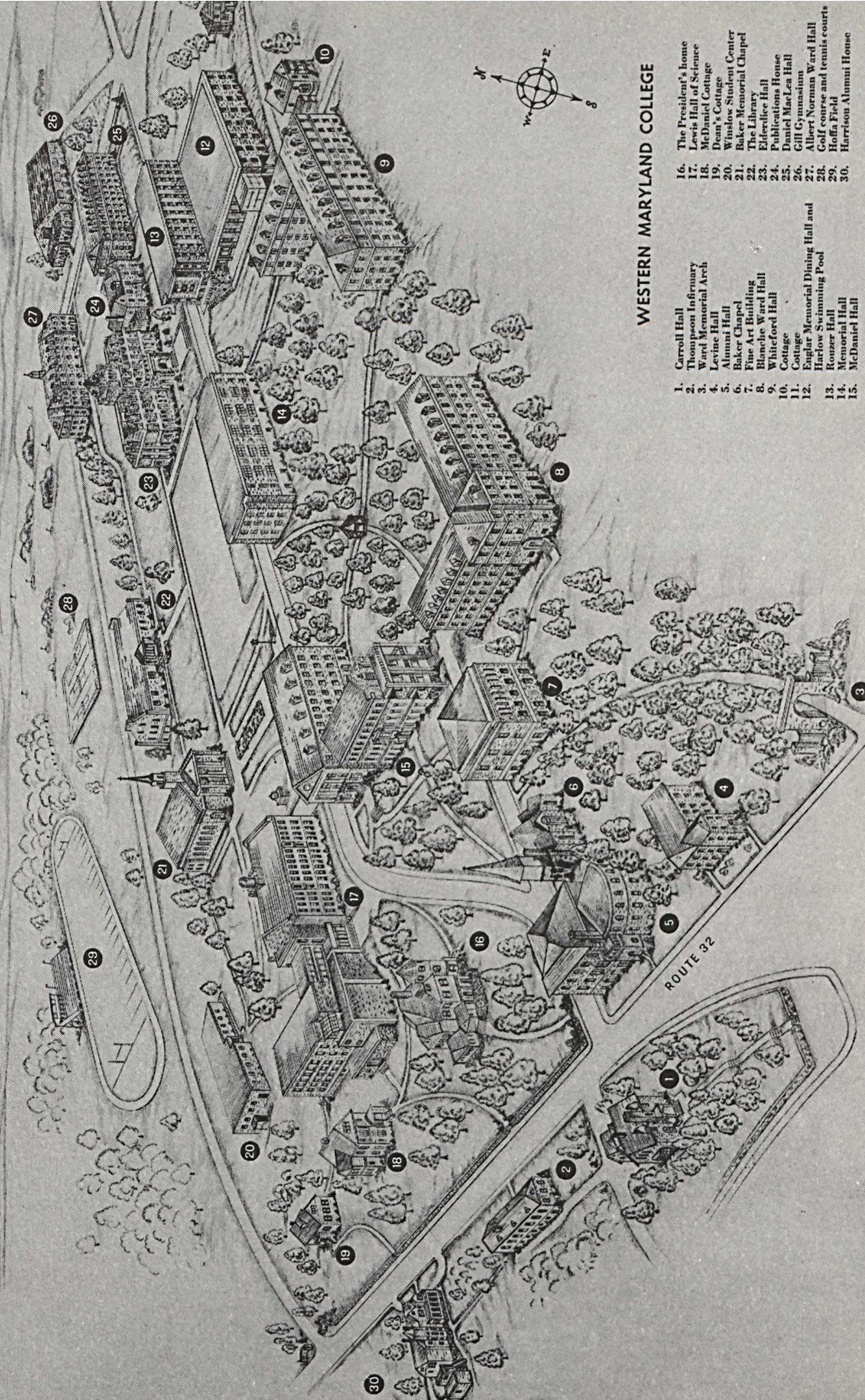
