REGISTRATION PROCEDURE

RETURNING STUDENTS

1. Registration forms are available at Education Office, Western Maryland College, (848-7000, ext. 233) and in county personnel offices.
2. Complete the form, supply information on lines at right.
3. Indicate courses selected. Include suffix letter on off-campus course number.
4. Return to WMC in return envelope. Include \$10 for each course listed. (This is non-refundable, unless the College cancels the course, but is part of the total tuition of \$50 per credit hour.) Add \$5 late fee after June 5 for first term courses; after July 10 for second term.
5. Courses with insufficient enrollment will be canceled Fri., June 6 (first term), July 11 (second term). Notices will be sent.
6. At the first class the instructor will verify the attendance of each student. (If some emergency should prevent attendance at the first class, notify the Education Office at 848-7000, ext. 233, so that registration is retained.) A bill covering the balance of fees due will be mailed at once; enrollment will be terminated on accounts not paid in full by June 27 (first term) and August 1 (second term).
7. Students on campus may purchase books at the College Bookstore between 8:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m. Students in off-campus classes may receive books during the first class; charges will be added to the tuition bill.
8. Students desiring summer housing on campus should indicate this on the registration form. Room and board, per 5-week session is \$210.00. (No linen is supplied.)

WITHDRAWAL POLICY

It is assumed that a student will not withdraw from the college during a term. In the event that such a withdrawal is necessary, the effective date will be established by completion of an official withdrawal form approved by the Registrar. The grade of W will be recorded if withdrawal occurs during the first three weeks of a term. If a student's enrollment is terminated by the College for non-payment of fees a \$25 reinstatement fee will be added before that course may be resumed. If the course is not resumed, the reinstatement fee will be due before subsequent course enrollment. Room and Board Fees--Refund pro-rated from date services discontinued. June 16-27 FUTURE IN EDUCATION

27:579 3 sem. hr. Coordinator: Mr. Jerry Paradis

The last two decades have shown unprecedented change in education as well as other social institutions. Included change is projected as a constant for the future. Past standards and present processes can no longer be counted on to cope with the rapid change in education. This course will examine the scope of change and its implications for education. Emphasis will be placed on the impact of change for the classroom.

June 30-July 11 THE OPEN SCHOOL CONCEPT

27:514 3 sem. hr. Coordinator: Mr. Jerry Paradis

A study of new techniques and methods for effective use of the open space concept in the public school. It is designed for those who are teaching in an open space school or who expect to do so. Topics include team teaching, effective grouping, management of space, and curriculum implications for individualizing instruction. Visits to open space schools are included.

July 21-August 1 ORGANIZATIONAL CLIMATE LEADERSHIP AND ORGANIZATIONAL BEHAVIOR

27A:573 3 sem. hr. Coordinator: Dr. James Davis

The concept of organizational climate will be studied extensively as it relates to the effectiveness of school administration. Special attention will be given to the role of leadership and its effect on organizational behavior. The development and uses of organizational climate instruments such as the O.C.D.Q. will be studied. Focus will be on the practical applications for the improvement of school climates.

August 4-15 APPLICATIONS IN SECONDARY MATHEMATICS

27:580 3 sem. hr. Coordinator: Mrs. Bernice Kastner Carroll Hall Room 101

A study of a number of applications of secondary school mathematics chosen from biology, music, astronomy, medicine, optics, sociology, economics, physics, etc. Participants will develop some applications relating to their specific junior or senior high school classroom activities.

August 4-15 LEADERSHIP IN EDUCATION: COMPETENCY BASED TEACHER EDUCATION

27:581 3 sem. hr. Coordinator: Mr. Michael Crosby Carroll Hall Room 102

CBTE has become a significant movement in reforming teacher education, both on the preservice and inservice levels. It is imperative that teacher leaders, both teachers and administrators, understand this movement and participate full in it. The course is designed for teachers and school administrators involved with student teaching or in-service programs. Prior experience in writing individualized instructional material is required.

August 25-29 LANGUAGE ACQUISITION AND INTERVENTION STRATEGIES FOR THE LANGUAGE RETARDED

27S:551 3 sem. hr. Coordinator: Dr. Donald Rabush

A two week indepth study of language development to include assessment of language skills and the development of programs for the retarded. One half of the course will be devoted to actual work with children.

ADDITIONS/CHANGES

First Term

Course Descriptions:

21-341 - The Oral Study of Literature

The study, adaptation, and performance of various forms of literature in order to interpret and communicate to an audience a literary work in its intellectual, emotional, and aesthetic entirety.

21-343 - Theatre for Children

Approaches to children's theatre; creative dramatics and dramatic literature; writing, directing, and staging plays for children with emphasis on the techniques and methods of play construction and production.

Second Term

ADD 93-162 - Contemporary Latin American Fiction 3 D.A. Williams Code 3

Room - M007

A critical study based on readings and discussions of selected representative works of main novelists and short story writers of the twentieth century Borges, Cortazar, Rulfo, Sabato, and Garcia Marquez. Emphasis will be given to aesthetic values and artistic self-expression, but historical and contemporary ideological currents will be taken into consideration. Special emphasis is given to the interrelationship of social and literary history.
