Independent Studies

(1198, 2298, 3398, 4498)

Independent studies are included in the curricular offerings of various departments to provide students with the opportunity for individual study under direction of a faculty member. The study, agreed upon by the sponsoring faculty member and the student, should be an experience not otherwise available within the regular college course offering. All students who plan to be on campus for this type of study or project must be enrolled in this course, regardless of the credit involved.

Internships

(1195, 2295, 3395, 4495)

The College conducts an active program of student internships through cooperative programs with the government, business, industry, institutions, and individuals. Internships are arranged directly through the academic departments. Each internship must be sponsored by a member of the faculty. The student should submit a written proposal to the faculty sponsor, outlining the academic dimensions and objectives of the internship.

NOTE: A department is under no obligations to accept independent study or internship students. All independent study and/or internship contract forms should be submitted in final form to the Registrar's Office.

Common Ground

London Summer Internship (through Arcadia U.): A 7-week internship program in such areas arts, business, communications, public policy, or the social sciences. Dates: early June-late July

IRELAND (through CEA): Irish History and Heritage in Cork (6 credits)

Dates:: early July-late July (4 weeks).

Courses in Irish studies, history, and literature.

Burren College of Art (through Butler U.) in Ballyvaughan (4-6

Dates: June-July or June-August

AUSTRALIA (through Arcadia U.): Environmental Management of Tropical Reef and Island Ecosystems

Dates: June 29-July 31

An intensive, four-week program that focuses on the study of tropical island and reef ecology and the strategies used to manage these ecosystems. The course emphasizes field-study and includes snorkeling expeditions throughout the Great Barrier Reef World Heritage Area.

- 1. Registration may be completed by mail, fax, or in person. Return the completed form to the Registrar's Office at least one week before classes begin.
 - 2. Registration for more than eight credit hours requires approval from the Office of Academic Affairs.
 - 3. Any request for a change in registration (add/drop/grade) must be made in writing to the Registrar's Office. A student may officially withdraw from any course without academic penalty if the withdrawal occurs before the midpoint of the class. After the midpoint, a grade of "F" will be recorded. Failure to attend class or to pay billing statement does not constitute official withdrawal from the course.
 - 4. The Bursar's Office will mail a billing statement to cover the balance of fees. The balance is due upon receipt. Beginning the week prior to the first class session, a \$35.00 late fee will be charged for registration.
 - Students may purchase books and supplies at the College Bookstore (Monday—Friday, 8:30 am to 4:30 pm).
 Identification cards are available in the ID Office next to the dining hall. Parking permits are issued by the Office of Campus Safety.
 - 6. Academic and student life policies may be found in the undergraduate catalog and the Student Handbook.
 - 7. Final exams will be given during the last class meeting unless otherwise specified by the professor.

Private Music Lessons: McDaniel College offers private music lessons to students under the instruction of a willing faculty member. Registration for private music lessons requires the completion of the Private Music Lesson Registration form which is available in the Registrar's Office and in the Music Department.

Internships: McDaniel College offers students, under the sponsorship of a faculty member, an internship experience to explore and test career interests through cooperative programs with government, business, industry, institutions and individuals.

Independent/Special Studies: These courses provide students with the opportunity to pursue independently, under the direction of a faculty member, a project or area of study which interests them.

- 1. To be eligible for credit, internships and independent/special studies must include academic dimension (e.g., readings, seminars, conferences, and reports).
- 2. The number of credits allowed for an individual internship or independent/special studies varies with academic content and hours to be spent in study. It is assumed that at least 37 hours, exclusive of travel, will be required for 1 credit.
- 3. These experiences will be billed at the per credit hour rate of \$250.00.
- 4. The maximum number of credits in internships applicable to graduation requirements is twelve credits.

After consultation and agreement with a faculty sponsor, each student must submit to the faculty sponsor a complete detailed **written** proposal, indicating the academic dimensions of the study (e.g., required readings, seminar requirements, etc.), the prerequisites of the study (courses, readings), type of grading, objectives, deadlines, basis for final evaluation and final product. This may be a written report, a detailed account of performance, an artistic presentation, etc. Students must present a signed approval form to the Registrar to receive academic credit for Internships or Independent/Special Studies.

Tuition

Per credit hour\$250.00 (regular courses are 4 credit hours)

Students interested in enrolling in one credit hour of private music lessons must complete 14 hours of lessons and will be billed \$250.00 for tuition in addition to the \$500.00 private lesson fee.

Students enrolling in ½ credit of private music lessons must complete 7 hours of lessons and will be billed \$125.00 for tuition in addition to the \$250.00 private lesson fee.
