Transcripts Of Records

Students may have official transcripts mailed to other institutions, prospective employers, and authorized agencies by completing a transcript request form. Allow two to four working days for processing and mailing the transcripts; however, due to the volume of requests, the processing time is longer at the end of each term. College I.D. Cards

Identification cards are issued to all graduate students and are required when checking out materials from Hoover Library or using College facilities such as the golf course and fitness center. Identification cards can be obtained from the ID office with proof of a valid student identification number. The office is located in the lower level of Decker College Center next to the Englar Dining Hall and is open from 10:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m., Monday through Friday, or call the I.D. office at 410-857-2730. The first card is free but there will be a \$20 replacement charge for lost ID cards.

Parking Permits

All motor vehicles parked on the McDaniel College campus must be registered with the Department of Campus Safety (410-857-2202). As a graduate student, you will be charged \$20 for parking each semester (fall, spring, summer) if you are enrolled in an on-campus course (excluding comps and internships). These permits are distributed in postcard form at regular intervals in advance of and one week after the start of each semester by the Department of Campus Safety. You must obey all rules regulating parking (located at www.mcdaniel.edu/docs/info/parking.shtml) and MUST keep the permit for the current semester displayed on your vehicle's front dashboard in such a way that it can be read through the windshield. Room and Board

Housing for graduate students (for summer only) begins on Sunday, June 24, and is available in the North Village apartments. Rooms are single and double occupancy in the five- and six-person apartments.

A limited number of single rooms will be assigned on a first-come, first-serve basis. Deadline for housing deposit is June 1. Since there are kitchen facilities available in the apartments, you are not required to be on the meal plan. Grades and Degrees

All students in good standing with the College can view their grades and academic record on the Archway. Grades are typically posted 48 hours after the last class meeting (2 weeks for PLS courses). Grade reports for Session 1 will be mailed after July 24, for Session 2 after June 26, for Session 3 after July 24 and for Session 4 after August 7. All grades for PLS courses will be mailed after August 17. Please allow sufficient time before phoning to inquire about your grades and/or degree.

Degrees will be posted on transcripts by the middle of September. Diplomas are ordered after all students have been certified for graduation and take 3-4 weeks to arrive. Please wait until early October to inquire about your diploma.

Enrollment Policies

Add/Drop

Prior to the start of class students may add or drop a class using the Archway. After classes start, you may add a class only if you have the approval of the instructor; an add/drop form, with the instructor's signature, must be processed with the Registrar's Office. You may drop a class after it has begun either by submitting a signed add/drop form or by sending an e-mail from your official McDaniel College e-mail address to the Registrar's Office. Please include your name, student ID number, the title, number and section for the course or courses you want to drop and a daytime phone number.

You cannot drop a class using the Archway after classes have started. Notifying the instructor of the class that you are dropping is common courtesy but is NOT an official drop.

Please refer to the deadlines to drop classes listed in the front of this Bulletin under the Session Calendar.

Add/Drop forms are available online or in the Registrar's Office. Forms may be dropped off at the Registrar's Office during regular office hours (8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.) or put in the mail slot in the office door after hours.

Withdrawal

If students determine they are unable to complete their academic program or continue enrollment in classes, they should withdraw from the College. Students must notify the Graduate Records Office in writing if they intend to withdraw from the College.

Availability of Courses

Early registration can prevent the cancellation of a course because of insufficient enrollment or guarantee a place in a course that is likely to close because of high demand. To ensure availability of the courses you need, please register early.

Courses with insufficient enrollment will be cancelled one week before the starting date, and students will be notified through their McDaniel e-mail account.

All courses meet on campus unless noted otherwise. Class locations, directions and other course details are available on the Archway by clicking on a specific course title. Graduate credit is given for courses numbered 500-699. Undergraduates may not enroll in courses numbered 500 and above except with the approval of the Provost. All graduate courses offer 3 semester hours of credit unless otherwise noted.

Students may also register via mail, fax, or in person. Please complete the enclosed registration form. You must fill in all course information including Session Number, Department, Course Number, Section Number, Credit Hours, Title, and Instructor Approval when required. Return this registration form to the McDaniel College Registrar's Office. You may fax your registration form to 410/857-2752.

PLEASE NOTE: Students will no longer be mailed a registration statement or confirmation letter. The information contained in those documents can now be found on the Archway.

Billing and Financial Aid

Graduate tuition is \$290 per credit hour or \$870 per three-credit course for on-campus courses. (Anyone having reached the age of 60 may audit a class at the rate of \$25 per credit.) Tuition and fees must be paid in full PRIOR to the first class. Checks should be made payable to McDaniel College and mailed to the Bursar's Office. Credit cards are accepted (Visa, Mastercard, Discover). Do not send cash. Payment plans are not available due to the brevity of the sessions. An additional charge (late payment penalty) of \$50 per month will be added if payment is not received in the Bursar's Office by the first class. The proceeds of a Federal Stafford Loan are exempt from the late payment penalty provided a completed application is received in the Financial Aid Office (located in Elderdice Hall, 410/857-2233) by May 2, 2007.

Tuition for education courses, EDU 515, 517, 518, 521, 526, 528, 529, 535, 536, 540, 541, and 543, offered in collaboration with Performance Learning Systems, Inc., is \$795 except when offered online.

Though no payment is required at the time of registration, you may include a credit card number, expiration date (Visa, MasterCard, Discover accepted) and amount on the registration form. Your credit card will be charged upon receipt of the form. You may also attach a check payment. Please do not send cash. Students who register on or after the first day of class will incur a \$35 late registration fee. Receipts will be mailed at the close of the semester about the same time grades are released.

Students who wish to apply for financial aid must be accepted into an eligible master's degree or student teaching certification program and be enrolled for at least six credit hours each semester. The financial aid application materials can be found on the McDaniel College Web site or by contacting the financial aid office. Financial aid awards are posted on the Archway. Advance book funds can be made available on the All Card for use at the College bookstore by contacting Ellie Geiman at egeiman@mcdaniel.edu

Graduate students' financial obligations must be met in order for students to be permitted to enter class, enroll in a subsequent course, graduate, and request transcripts. Students who have not fulfilled payment obligations may be dropped from current and blocked from future registrations until payment obligations are met. Additionally, the student is responsible for attorney's fees and other costs necessary for the collection of any amount due.

Refund Policy

Failure to attend class or non-payment does not constitute a withdrawal. Tuition refunds are based on the amount of time elapsed since the start of class.

At any point after the start of the class, the following refund policy will prevail:

Percent of class Amount of tuition time elapsed: to be refunded:

7 percent 80 percent
13 percent 60 percent
20 percent 40 percent
27 percent 20 percent

After 27 percent of class time, there will be no refund of tuition.

Comprehensive Exam

On Saturday, July 21, 2007 (9:00 a.m.-12 noon), the College will administer the Comprehensive Exams for master's degree students who are completing their programs in all areas. The registration deadline for comprehensive exams is June 15. Please include the \$100 testing fee with your registration form. Anyone registering for comps after the June 15 deadline must have approval and will be assessed a late fee of \$25. If you have registered for comps and withdraw without approval within 10 days of the exam, you will forfeit the \$100 testing fee. Students will receive notification of the testing location when they receive their study guide. Study guides are mailed after the registration deadline and four weeks prior to the exam. You must be registered to receive a study guide.

CED 566 01 Special Topics:
Domestic Violence and the Impact
on the Family System

Characteristics of perpetrators and
victims will be addressed in depth
as well as the effects of intimate
partner violence on children.

CUR 503 Learning and Instruction
This course examines current
theories about psychological
influences on student learning.
Participants examine personal teaching and learning experiences to
strengthen the development of their
personal foundations for designing
and implementing instruction.
A case study approach is used for

CUR 505 Differentiation and Technology

ENG 566 01 Special Topics: Contemporary Black Literature This course explores how contemporary literature engages recent world events and national debates through representations of the past. Particular focus is given to literature as a space of intervention and agency through which authors emphasize the significance of marginalized issues to society as a whole. Students will situate the literature in its social context through close analysis, and engagement with current policies, politics and debates. Texts may include The Known World, Beloved, The Farming of Bones, and Dreamer. (Contemporary Society)

ENG 566-02 Special Topics: King Arthur in Literature and Film This course investigates the major traditions of Arthurian literature from the Middle Ages to Monty Python. We'll begin with the medieval development of the myth of Arthur in Celtic, Latin, French and Middle English texts (all read in translation), including Sir Gawain and the Green Knight and Malory's Morte Darthur. In the second half of the course, we will examine the adaptability of the Arthurian legend to the changing values of different eras by analyzing Victorian and modern adaptations such as Tennyson's Idylls of the King, T.H. White's The Once and Future King, and Marion Zimmer Bradley's feminist revision of the legend, The Mists of Avalon. We will also consider the Arthurian legend in several films, including Monty Python and the Holy Grail and Excalibur. (Cultural Heritage)

EPE/GRN 566 01 Special Topics: **Exercise and Aging**

This course will focus on the physiological adaptations associated with exercise training in older adults. These adaptations will be compared to those in a younger exercising population as well as to sedentary older adults. The impact of exercise on chronic diseases will also be discussed.

EPE 566 02 Special Topics: Sports Marketing

Sports Marketing presents an overview of the various techniques and strategies utilized to meet the wants and needs of the sports consumer in the sports industry. Areas to be addressed include the uniqueness of the sports marketing in comparison to traditional marketing, an overview of the segments of the sports industry, the importance of

market research and segmentation in identifying the right sports consumer, the utilization of data base marketing in reaching the sports consumer, the overview of the marketing mix, the development of sponsorship and endorsement packages.

EPE 566 03 Special Topics: Principles of Strength and Conditioning

This course is designed to enhance the students' understanding of the principles related to strength training and conditioning. The techniques, design, administration and evaluation of a comprehensive program will be presented.

EPE 566 04 Special Topics: Motor Learning for Coaches This course examines the principles of motor learning as they relate to various sport/athletic settings. Traditional methods and myths will be evaluated using current research. Students will analyze techniques used in practice, pre-game, and competition.

SLM 566 01 Special Topics: **Professional Communication for** School Librarians

This project-based course will focus on communication genres important to school librarians with the goal of enhancing the /quality /of those productions. Students will develop rhetorical strategies for successful grant writing and will gain experience in writing grant proposals to relevant associations (i.e., IRA, AASL, and MICCA). They will gain knowledge of visual design principles essential to the creation of professional-looking videos and websites, and will learn what makes successful writing changes as we move from paper to the screen. This knowledge will be applied to the creation of a short video and the development or expansion of a school library website. Prerequisites: SLM 507 encouraged,

but not required.

SED 513 OL Bilingual Special Education

This is a survey course that addresses the basic issues surrounding the teaching and learning of culturally and linguistically diverse exceptional learners. Topics concerning bilingual special education will be covered including: premises of bilingual/multicultural/special education; culture and acculturation; native language development, second language acquisition, and language assessment; general

assessment; referral and diagnostic process; federal and state laws; individualized education programs (IEP's), curriculum development; inclusion and mainstreaming; consultation services; and parental involvement.

(Note: This course does not fulfill MSDE requirements for ESOL certification.)

Common Ground On The Hill

Common Ground On The Hill is a traditional music and arts curriculum whose purpose is to offer a quality learning experience with master musicians, artists and crafts people while exploring cultural diversity in search of a "common ground" among ethnic, gender, age and racial groups. Courses include instrumental music, singing and songwriting, dance, fine arts and crafts, film, literature, children's program, writing, storytelling and human arts.

Students enrolling in the Common Ground comprehensive curriculum (\$420 fee or \$390 early bird special if paid in full by May 1, 2007) may elect to receive graduate credits from McDaniel College for an additional fee of \$150 per credit. If you are not already a McDaniel College graduate student, there is a \$50 application fee. Students may enroll in a special topics course in one of the following disciplines: Art, English, Humanities, or Music. Additional work will be required. On campus registration is July 1 and 8. You may preregister through the Common Ground Web site: www.commongroundonthehill.org Classes meet July 2-6, July 9-13.

A special Common Ground offering, an Institute on Nonviolence for Teachers, will be offered in conjunction with Common Ground this summer. The one-week institute is designed to provide an exciting range of experiences, ideas, and resources on nonviolence with application to conflict resolution, problem solving and human relationships. Students may elect to earn 3 graduate credits through independent study or CEU's.
