


Thus, as a token of appreciation, we dedicate the 1961 ALOHA to you—William L. Tribby: scholar, teacher, friend.



PURSUING ACADEMIC IDEALS

Here at Western Maryland, student interests have often sparked the formation of special clubs and societies, many of which are directly related to our classroom pursuits. Those people drawn to classical heritage, for instance, have formed and perpetuated a Classics Club; likewise, people interested in addition, anyone in our student body has an opportunity to become a part of the Home Economics Club, the Student Education Association, or the International Relations Club.

People who have proven themselves not only interested but also proficient in their studies may become members of the Argonauts, our campus honor society. National honoraries have a place on the Hill, too: in music, Delta Omicron; in social sciences. Pi Gamma Mu; and in biology, Beta Beta Beta, Each of these societies works to foster more research in its field and to bring together people who have common interests. Such societies could not be continued without student support and initiative, however.

Indeed, this same initiative has brought to us this year what is perhaps the prime example of student participation in campus life; for when the symbolic remnant of Old Main was mounted at the center of our campus last spring, another strong yet more intangible cornerstone was being set in our school's changing foundation. This was the idea of an academic honor system for Western Maryland College. Entirely student-initiated, student-legislated, and finally accepted by the students as a body, our honor system now begins to mark its influence in the classroom and, we hope, in every phase of our college's student lie.

EXAMINING SPIRITUAL CONVICTIONS

In various ways through the years, Western Maryland has tried to help her students gain insight into their individual lives. This aim has become an integral part of the Hill, as evidenced by the always-open doors of the small Baker Chapel, the Sunday evening services that fill the sanctuary with the richness of musical chords, and especially by the activities of religious organizations on the campus. The Religious Life Council represents these different denominational groups and coordinates activities that have in years past become traditions at Western Maryland.

This year the largest religious organization on campus, the S.C.A., succeeded in arousing interest in their new program; "Last Lectures" provided a new Wednesday evening attraction as we heard some of our own prolessors deliver what they might say if they were addressing their last class. The S.C.A. also sponsored a quiet Christmas communion in Baker Memorial Chapel that lent a praceful touch to our last holiday activities on the Hill. Another event greeted with anticipation was the annual Easter play, a tradition for which our class is proudly responsible. We watched, also, as arrangements were made for our yearly W-U.S. bazaar, which was supported by the entire campus. Smaller denominational groups were at work this year, too, expanding membership or joining forces in a united effort to further encourage fellowship.

The question of real participation still rests with each individual, however, for all the associations, clubs, and organizations imaginable will profit us nothing if we cannot reach other people with our purpose and with our enthusiasm. Anyone concerned about the wonders and questions in our universe, anyone who has ever marvelled at the seasonal frieze surrounding our college or at the smallness of us all-surely this same individual has also, from time to time, looked within himself and begun to discover there the same infinite spark. It is in this search for insight that our campus life has found its greatest challenge. And it is only through continued cooperation and understanding that students at Western Maryland will be able to vitalize their spiritual concerns.






The Green Terror Gridmen closed the 1960 season with a winning 6 and 8 record and as co-holders of the Mason-Dison Conference crown. Opening with a victory over Bridgewater. Terror quarterbacks Roy Terry and Skip Brown used the roll-out pass effectively against the Eagles. Fred Dilks highlighted the Penn Military game with an intercepted pass return for 40 yards, and Roy Terry's pass to Dick Yobst in the Randolph-Macon clash turned the tide in the favor of Western Maryland.

Outgaining the Hampden-Sydney squad, the Terrors were unable to overcome the aerial game of the southern team, and poor pass defense accounted for the heavy loss to Juniata.

In their first game with the National Aggies, the Green and Gold came from behind three times to finally win in the remaining minutes of the contest. 

VOICE OF THE STUDENTS

All students at Western Maryland are members of their Student Government Association, a governing body that meets weekly and includes representatives and a cabinet of voting members elected by the students. This year's S.G.A. has exhibited an active concern for campus participation in student government by holding monthly open meetings and by fostering the growth of new ideas in the wellplanned fall leadership conference.

Other responsibilities of the S.G.A. include orientation week, Homecoming, and special school activities. By far, however, the largest task of the S.G.A. has been ironing out the wrinkles in our new honor system, a student initiated venture.

This same initiative is the spark of our success; every student should become familiar with his campus government and, we hope, follow the example of this year's able leaders.
