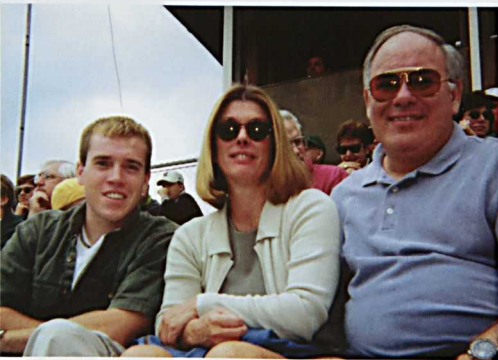

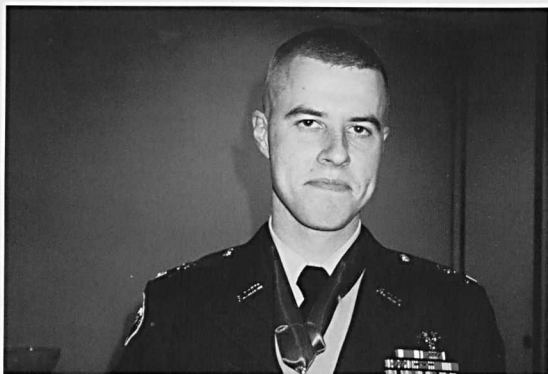


Bathing in the Ganges River is a ritual that a large amount of Indians take part in. Fortunately, Jamie was able to witness this early one morning while the ship was docked in India.

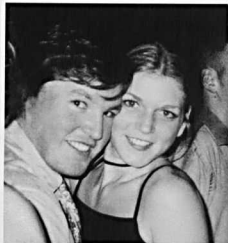

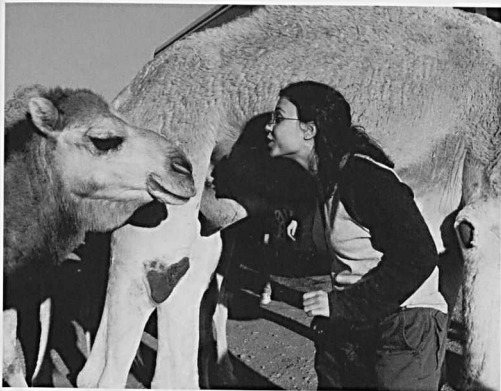

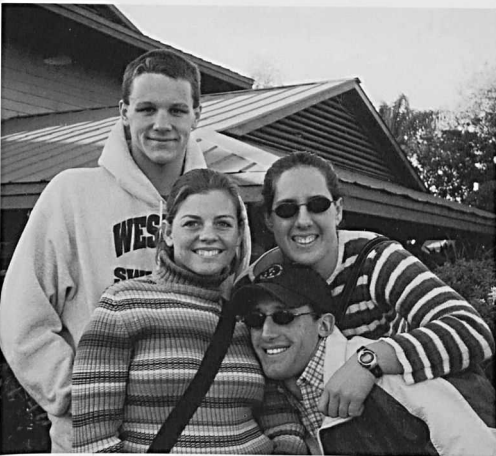

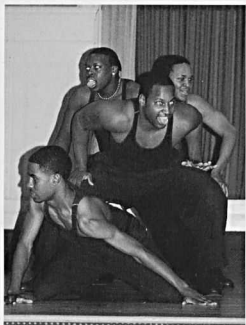

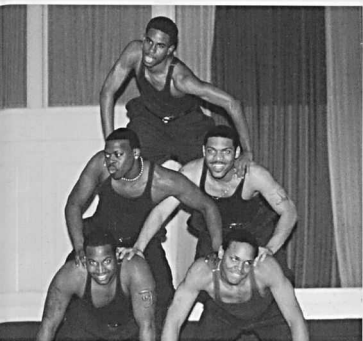

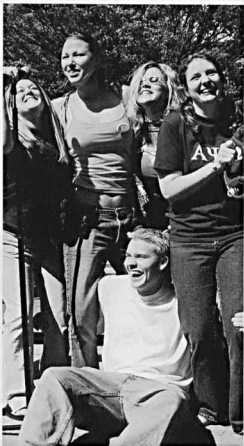

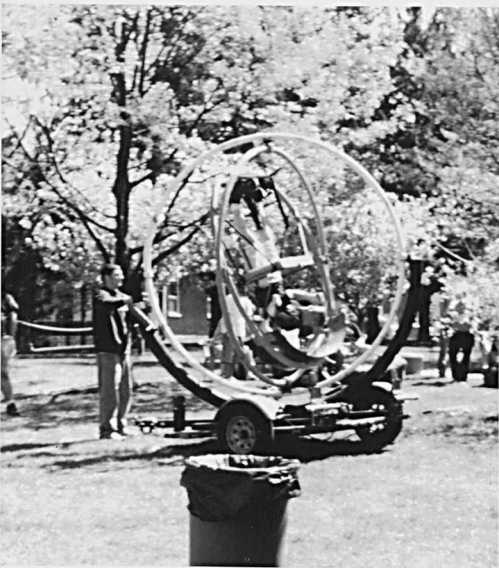

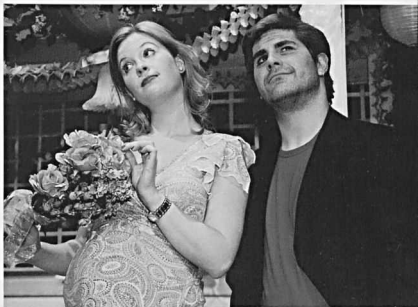

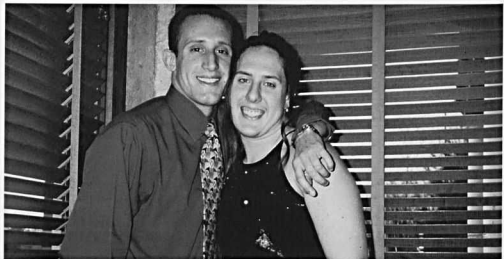

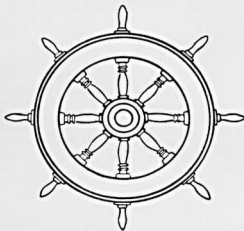

Albert Norman Ward (ANW) is the home to various sophomores, juniors and seniors. There are also fraternities and sororities that live in the suites in this building.



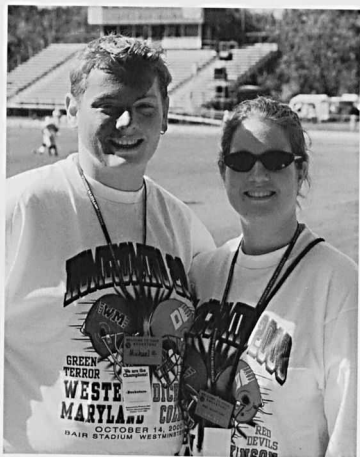
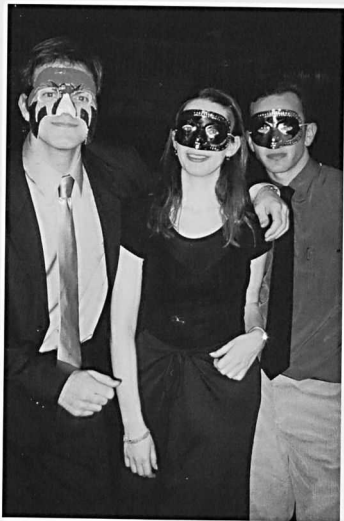
Being the most active dorm on campus, Blanche Ward is the home to sophomores and upperclassmen. Both men and women live there, as well as many fraternities and sororities.



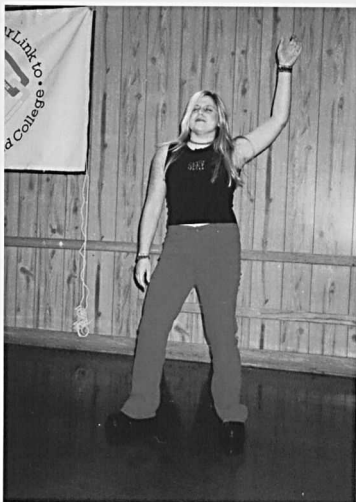

Terror Turns Up the Heat ... Again



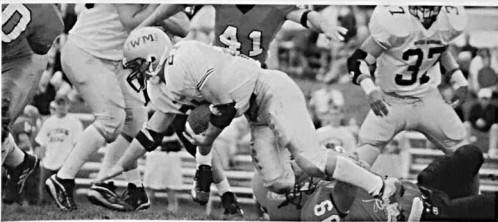

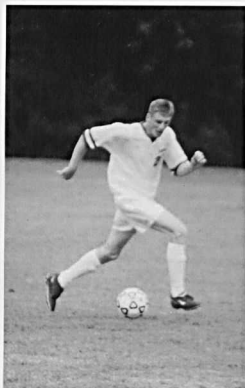

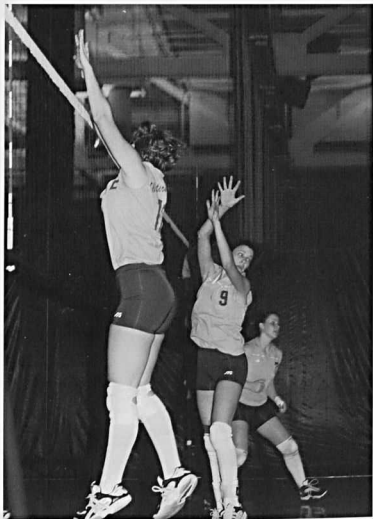

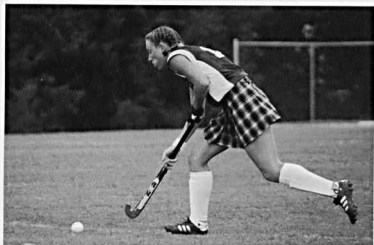

Giving Their All

Injuries prevented this year's womens team from having a realistic shot at defending the conference championship from last fall. The team highlights included winning the York Invitational for the second year in a row, finishing second in the Shepherd Invitational and improving to fourth at the Frostburg Invitational.

Individually, Jill Krebs was the top runner, qualifying for the NCAA national championships for the second year in a row. At the championship, on a snow and mud covered golf course in Spokane, WA., Jill finished 18th out of 211 runners to earn All-American honors for the second year in a row. She improved from her 35th place finish as a sophomore. Jill won the first three invitational on our schedule, establishing new

course records each time. She has won both the Shepherd Invitational and York Invitational all three years that she competed.

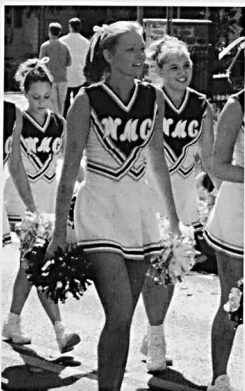

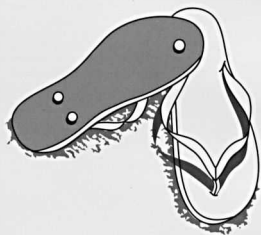
Making Waves

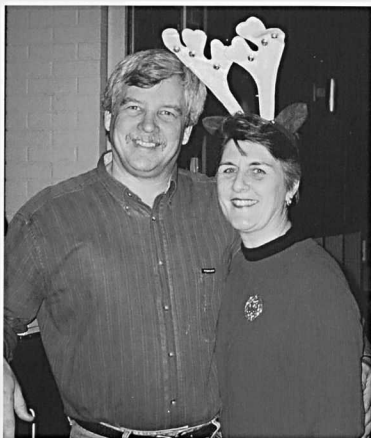

Farewell Professor Julie Badiee

In May 2001, the College lost one of its finest art professors. After two long years, Dr. Julie Badiee lost her battle against brain cancer. She was a member of the WMC faculty since 1978. Dr. Badiee was an internationally recognized authority on Islamic Art. During her years at Western Maryland, she organized and maintained the College's 15,000 art slides. In 1996, Dr. Badiee was the first recipient of the Ira G. Zepp Award for Distinguished Teaching. Professor Badiee took part in the University of Pittsburgh's Semester at Sea in 1998, where she taught students while sailing around the world. 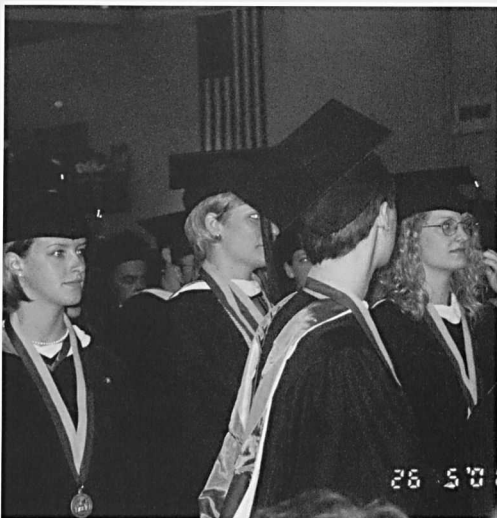


Headed in the Right Direction



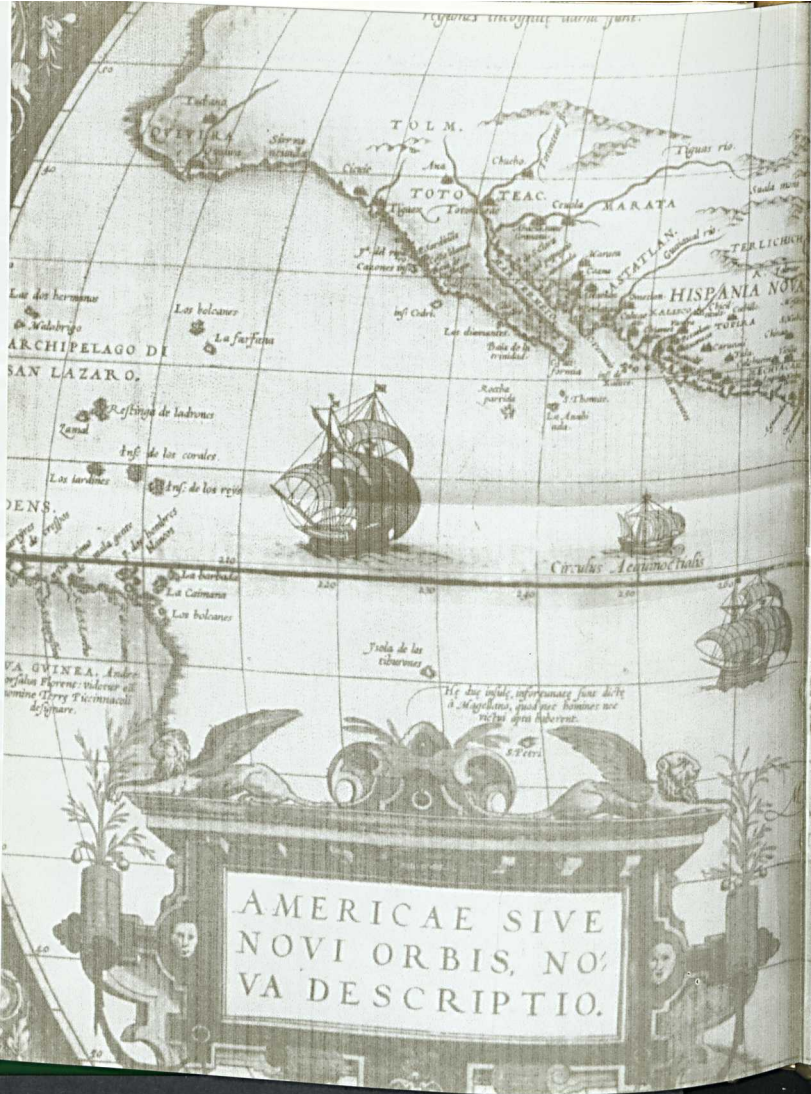
